The Statue of Liberty Enlightening the World was conceived as a symbol ocratic values. Designed by French sculptor Frédéric-Auguste Bartholdi, the statue was transported to the United States in 350 pieces and dedicated by President Grover Cleveland on October 28, 1886. It was designated a Na-

tional Monument in 1924 and maintained by the National Park Service since 1933. UNESCO recognizes it as a World Heritage site but remains U.S. government property.

Glucksmann's remarks are the latest in a wave of criticism from European leaders over the direction of American democracy, particularly under former

Return to Jim Crow: Federal Regulations Rolled Back to Allow Segregation

The Trump administration has blatantly resurrected segregation in federal contracting, undoing decades of civil rights progress by removing antisegregation mandates. The alarmingly regressive move reopens the door for racially divided facilities, eerily reminiscent of the Jim Crow era, with potential "Whites Only" and

"Colored" signage in government-funded workplaces. "This isn't just a policy shift; it's a moral catastrophe," stated Melissa Murray, a constitutional law professor at New York University, in an NPR interview. "We are witnessing the deliberate dismantling of civil rights protections that generations fought to secure."



However, this sudden shift has sparked accusations of undermining democracy and transparency. An anonymous federal employee expressed outrage to NPR. "This is an outright assault on democratic norms, a covert operation to reintroduce segregation without public scrutiny," the unnamed employee remarked. The National Institutes of Health and other federal agencies have received directives to disregard previous antisegregation clauses in their contracting processes. In-

quiries to the General

Services Administration about bypassing established procedural protocols were met with vague assurances. "The GSA is committed to implementing executive orders effectively and promptly," GSA spokesperson Will Powell

Kara Sacilotto, an attorney specializing in federal contracts, pointed out the broad attack on civil rights, noting that the targeting of these protections extends beyond racial lines to include gender identity, previously expanded under the Obama administration. "It's clear the target is not just racial equality but all forms of civil rights progress," Sacilotto explained. Professor Murray added, "This isn't just a rollback of civil rights protections—it's a signal that we're stepping back into a darker past, one that we've worked hard to move beyond."







The Superior Priesthood of Christ

Hebrews 7:23-28

In the author's considera-

tion of the Melchizedecan Priesthood, of which Jesus Christ is a type, the author has proven that the Melchizedecan Priesthood is superthe Aaronic ior to Priesthood. Melchizedek was a mysterious figure who lived prior to the establishment of the Aaronic Priesthood. He was the king of Salem or Jerusalem, the city of peace. His name means king of righteous. King of peace, king of righteousness are the titles that could be applied to Jesus. This has been proven historically, for Abraham honored Melchizedek above Levi; also it was proven doctrinally, for Psalm 110:4 definitely states that God has made a change in the priesthood and thus, in the Mosaic Law. Since Levitical Priesthood stemmed from Abraham, even priest born of Aaron were involved through Abraham in the payment of tithes. By tithing to Melchizedek and receiving a blessing from him, Abraham demonstrated that Melchizedek was his superior (Heb. 7:4-10). Continuing his presentation on the Superior Priesthood of Jesus Christ, let us observe: "The Continuing Priesthood of Christ"

Jesus is able to minister for us effectively because He is a continuing Priest. As the writer of Hebrews says in verse 23-24: "And they were many priests, because they were not suffered to continue by reason of death. But this man, because He continueth ever, hath an unchangeable priesthood." The Old Testament priests were limited by length of life in their bringing people near to God. Christ, however, through His saving work and intercession provides continual access into God's presence. His work is not hindered by death.

Our Lord, who died for our sins, will not be dying anymore. Jesus Christ has an unchangeable priesthood because He lives by the power of an endless life! Thank God that Jesus Christ has an unchangeable priesthood, and we can call on Him at any time, for Hebrews 4:14-16 says: "Seeing

then that we have a great High Priest, that is passed into the heavens, Jesus the Son of God, let us hold fast our profession. For we have not an high priest which cannot be touched with the feeling of out infirmities; but was in all points tempted like as we are, yet without sin. Let us therefore come boldly unto the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy, and find grace to help in time of need." Having discussed "The Continuing Priesthood of Christ", let us observe "The Capable Priesthood of Christ."

II. The Capable Priesthood of Christ -Hebrews 7:25-28

The Lord Jesus is a qualified and capable priest, more capable than any Aaronic priest because He represented guilty mankind on the cross; and in so doing, He satisfied God's righteous indignation against sin. His death on the cross fully satisfied God's wrath against sin. Note that Jesus is referred to as "this man." This emphasizes Christ's humanity. His incarnation and death enable Him to function as our Priest because of His sacrifice that He offered. As our High Priest, His offering is acceptable for our forgiveness. In verse 25, because of Christ's Person and position, He can save to the uttermost. Uttermost means completely, entirely or perfectly. By having the qualities of both God and man, Jesus knows the will of God and the trials of man; so He can act as the Perfect Medi-

As our perfect High Priest, His life served as a marvelous testimony, Hebrews 7:26 says: "For such an High Priest became us, who is holy, harmless, undefiled, separate from sinners, and made higher than the heavens." His life on earth was undefiled, without any taint of sin! Although He mingled with sinners, He was separate from them. In verse 27, Aaron and his sons had to offer daily sacrifices, for themselves first, and then for the people. Christ, however, was sinless and His one sacrifice forever settled the sin problem. In verse 28, Aaron and his sons had infirmities of one kind or another; but Christ is unblemished and free from all sin and weak-

In summation, thank God that Christ's eternal priesthood brought surety of a better testament. Jesus' death and resurrection are God's guarantee that the promises of the new covenant will be fulfilled. Better testament, meaning covenant, compares the New Covenant established by Christ to the Mosaic Covenant. The Mosaic Covenant demanded fulfillment of the law for acceptance with God. We gain acceptance with God through faith in Jesus Christ's finished work on Calvary, because the New Covenant institutes salvation through the blood



South American soccer president apologizes for comparing Brazilian clubs to Tarzan's chimp

SAO PAULO (AP) — Alejandro Domínguez, the president of South American soccer body CONMEBOL, apologized Tuesday for his remarks the previous day comparing Brazilian clubs to a chimpanzee from Tarzan films.

Domínguez told journalists the previous night after the Copa Libertadores draw in Paraguay that the South American club tournament without Brazilian teams that have dominated it in recent years would be "like Tarzan without Cheetah."

"Regarding my recent statement, I want to express my apologies," Domínguez said in a statement. "The expression I used is a popular phrase and I never intended to belittle or discredit anyone. The CONMEBOL Libertadores is unthinkable without the participation of clubs from the 10 member countries. I reaffirm my commitment to continue

working for a fairer, more united soccer, free from discrimination."

CONMEBOL has been under increased pressure to act decisively against racism. Moments before his comment to journalists, Domínguez spoke in Portuguese and claimed CON-MEBOL has worked hard to stop racism. Several Brazilian players and fans have been targeted by monkey chants at away matches in recent years, which has also brought more pressure on the confederation's president to act.

The most recent case took place on March 6, when Palmeiras U-20 striker Luighi spoke with tears in his eyes about the racism he had endured from fans of Paraguay's Cerro Porteno in a U-20 Copa Libertadores match. Later, CONMEBOL fined the club \$50,000 and banned its supporters from attending the tournament,

which Brazilian clubs saw as a timid punishment.

Domínguez, who is from Paraguay, said in prepared remarks at the draw that he is sensitive to "Luighi's

"Our challenge is to be fair to those who are responsible for these acts," Domínguez said. "CONMEBOL applies sanctions and does everything in its power to change this reality. But it is not enough."

Brazil midfielder Bruno Guimarães criticized Domínguez during a press conference ahead of his team's World Cup qualifying match against Colombia on Thurs-

"The president of CON-MEBOL has a lot more to worry about that doing that kind of joke. We saw what happened in Luighi's case, the punishment given to Cerro Porteno was a tremendous lack of respect," Guimaraes said in Brasilia.

Trump says he's ending Secret Service protection for Biden's adult children

WASHINGTON (AP)
— President Donald
Trump said Monday he
was ending "immediately"
the Secret Service protection details assigned to
Democrat Joe Biden's
adult children, which the
former president had extended to July shortly before leaving office in
January.

The Republican president on social media objected to what he said were 18 agents assigned to Hunter Biden's protective detail while in South Africa this week. He said Ashley Biden has 13 agents assigned to her detail and that she too "will be taken off the list."

There was no immediate reaction from the former president's office.

Former presidents and their spouses receive lifelong Secret Service protection under federal law, but the protection afforded to their immediate families over the age of 16 ends when they leave office. But outgoing presidents can extend protection for those who might otherwise not be eligible for up to six months after they leave office, something Biden did for his children and Trump did for his family after leaving office in 2021. Former Presidents Barack Obama and George W. Bush also extended protection for their families for a period.

"We are aware of the President's decision to terminate protection for Hunter and Ashley Biden," the agency said in a statement. "The Secret Service will comply and is actively working with the protective details and the White House to ensure compliance as soon as possible."

While touring the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts Monday afternoon, a reporter asked Trump if he would revoke the protection for the former president's son.

"Well, we have done that with many. I would say if there are 18 with Hunter Biden, that will be something I'll look at this afternoon," Trump said, who added this was the first time he heard about the matter.

"I'm going to take a look at that," he said.

President Donald Trump. His policies on immigration, which included detaining families at the border, restricting asylum, and implementing travel bans, drew widespread condemnation. French leaders have not been shy in their criticism of Trump's foreign policy. Glucksmann's party has gone further, cal-

ling Trump's leadership "authoritarian" and accusing him of delivering Ukraine "on a silver platter" to Russia. Glucksmann's speech directly referenced The New Colossus, the 1883 poem by Emma Lazarus inscribed on the statue's pedestal. He invoked its message of refuge and freedom, only to argue that those ideals no longer reflect today's United States. "Today, this land is ceasing to be what it was," Glucksmann said.



Wildfires fueled by high winds swept across the state on Friday. The Oklahoma Department of Emergency Management said Sunday evening that over 400 homes were damaged statewide. Officials said Sunday that at least four people had died because of the severe weather in Oklahoma.

Jeremy Cook was among the residents in Stillwater, a city of about 50,000 located about 65 miles (100 kilometers) northeast of Oklahoma City, who returned home Saturday morning to find that his house was gone. Cook told The Oklahoman that when his family fled Friday, they loaded up three cars with photographs, pets, books, and paintings.

pets, books, and paintings.

After returning to find his home burned to the foundation, he said he was going back and forth "be-

going back and forth "between laughing and crying."

At least 74 homes in and

around Stillwater were destroyed by wildfires, Mayor Will Joyce said Sunday night on Facebook. Fire Chief Terry Essary said at a news conference Saturday that the fires spread rapidly and crews had difficulty containing each one because of the high winds and low humidity. He said they quickly became overwhelmed

whelmed.

"Nobody has enough resources to fight fires when the wind is blowing 70

mph," Essary said. "It's an insurmountable task."

The Oklahoma Department of Emergency Management said on Sunday evening that the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner had confirmed four fatalities related to the fires or high winds across the state. There was one death each in Lincoln, Garfield, Haskell, and Pawnee counties.

Details were not given on the deaths in Haskell and

Pawnee counties. Oklahoma Department of Emergency Management spokesperson Keli Cain said a person in Garfield County was killed in a vehicle accident due to poor visibility due to dust or smoke and that a man died in Lincoln County.

Deborah Ferguson told News 9 that her husband, Allen Ferguson, was killed in Lincoln County. She said that her husband and her 15-year-old son had been fighting a wildfire in a pasture on Friday, and as they fled on a four-wheeler, it crashed into a tree amid heavy smoke. She said her son was badly burned and is hospitalized.

Erin O'Connor, a spokesperson with the Texas A&M Forest Service, said the region on Friday had the "perfect recipe for wildfires" with high winds, dry conditions and above normal temperatures.
