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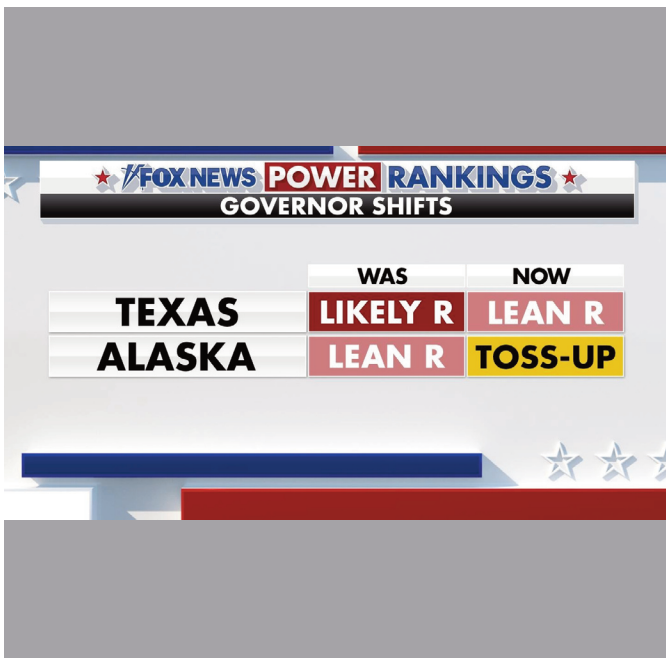

FOX NEWS SHIFTS TEXAS GOVERNOR'S RACE TOWARD GINA HINOJOSA



DALLAS, TX — This morning, FOX NEWS updated its power rankings for the 2026 midterm elections and shifted the Texas Governor's race toward Gina Hinojosa, moving it from "likely R" to now "lean R."

In making the shift, FOX NEWS also noted that three-term incumbent and career politician Greg Abbott is facing "his toughest re-election challenge yet" after 30 years in public office, in part, because of data centers that have invaded Texas on his watch.

"Greg Abbott isn't inter-

ested in protecting Texans. He's interested in protecting his re-election chances. That's why he's hitting the panic button and trying to look tough on AI data centers. If he really cared about Texas communities, he could've paused data center permitting and asked for an audit at any point over the last 11 years. Instead, he took \$20 million from data center special interests, vowed to make Texas the AI epicenter, and handed them some of the

U.S. Supreme Court declines to give surrogate custody of baby she birthed in Dallas

McKenna West fled to Texas to give birth last month, saying she could not trust the biological parents after they asked her to get an abortion.

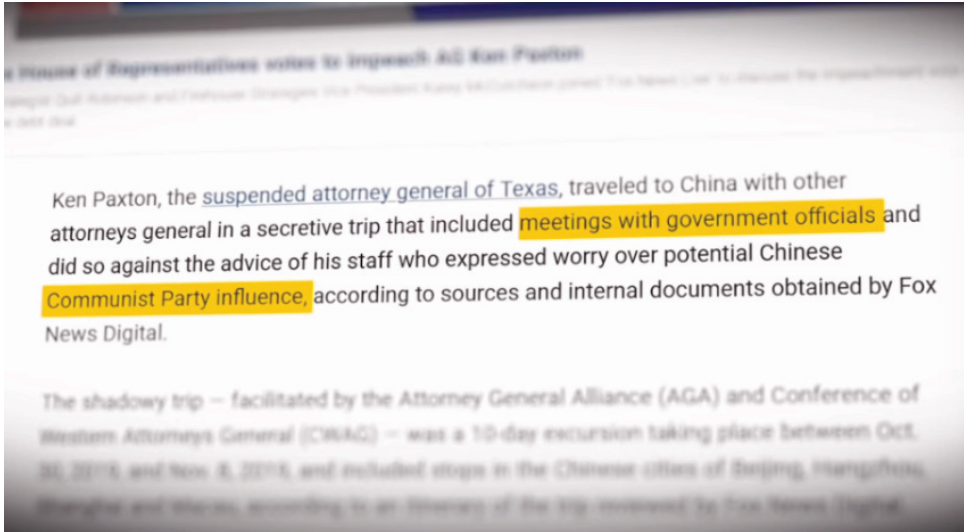
A California couple will maintain custody over the biological child they had through a surrogate in Texas after U.S. Supreme Court Justice Elena Kagan on Tuesday rejected a request to intervene in the high-profile case.

Kagan's order did not explain why she rejected surrogate McKenna West's request. The Alaskan nurse had sought conservatorship over the child, which would have given her a say in the child's medical treatment, and wanted Kagan to block a lower-court ruling in the couple's favor. Kagan oversees emergency court requests from California, where the couple's custody battle with West originated.

Nausheen Gilkar and Omar Ahmed had hired West after the couple struggled to have a child. In April, the fetus West was carrying was

TALARICO ★ FOR TEXAS ★ After New Report on Paxton's China-linked Donors, Talarico Campaign Releases New Digital Ad Exposing Ken Paxton's China Ties



AUSTIN, TX — Today, Talarico for Texas released a new digital ad slamming Ken Paxton for his China ties — taking an all-expenses-paid trip to China to meet with CCP officials and pocketing \$40,000 from China-linked real estate developers buying Texas land.

The ad reveals Paxton's hypocrisy as he

continues to make false claims that Talarico "sold Texas out to China."

Several Chinese real estate investors donated to Paxton's Senate campaign — and each donor works for "companies that facilitate the exact kind of Chinese investments he has criticized," wrote the Houston Chronicle.

Three years prior, Paxton secretly traveled to China against the advice of his staff, who raised concerns about CCP influence and surveillance concerns.

The Tribulation Temple, The Two Witnesses, The Seventh Trumpet Revelation 11:1-19

At the very outset of this chapter, the Apostle John is instructed to measure the sanctuary – the inner temple (holy place) and the holy of holies (v. 1). Many biblical scholars advance that a future temple will be built in Jerusalem during the Tribulation Period, and ancient rites will be carried out. This is the same temple that the Man of Sin (Anti-Christ) will emerge and demand to be worshipped and abolish Jewish worship (II Thesalonians 2:4). The Apostle John is told not to measure the outer court of the Gentiles (v. 2a). It seems the reason for leaving the outer court of Gentiles unmea-

sured because the city of Jerusalem will be trodden underfoot by the Gentiles for forty-two months (3½ years) (v. 2b). It is during the last part of the Tribulation Period (42 months or 3½ years) that the Man of Sin (Anti-Christ) will abolish Jewish worship and instead demand to be worshipped. In verses 3-14, we are introduced to courageous ministry of two witnesses of the Tribulation Period. According to verse 3, the time limit of their ministry is said to be one thousand two hundred sixty days (or 3½ years). Many biblical scholars believe that these two witnesses will minister

during the first half of the Tribulation Period because their witness will be terminated by the beast (Anti-Christ) in verse 7. According to verses 4-6, these two witnesses possess extraordinary character traits and will be able to exhibit unusual miraculous power similar to the ministry power of Elijah and Moses! However, their ministry will be terminated by the beast (Anti-Christ) (v. 7). The bodies of these two witnesses will lay in the streets of Jerusalem, without even being buried (vv. 8-9). The hostile people of the earth will celebrate the death of the two witnesses (v. 10). These people

of the Tribulation Period will indeed be overjoyed in the fact that their tormentors (two witnesses) are dead. However, in verses 11-14, a miraculous occurrence happens, in that the two witnesses are raised after lying in the streets for three and one-half days and translated to heaven. After the raising of these two faithful witnesses, there was a great earthquake, with seven thousand men being slain (v. 13). A remnant is terrified and gave glory to God and an announcement was made in verse 14: “The second woe is past; and behold, the third woe cometh quickly.” As this chapter con-

cludes, the sounding of the seventh trumpet brings an announcement that the dominion of the world is taken over by Christ (v. 15). The end of the Tribulation Period will be realized, and Christ taking what is rightfully His causes much praise from the elders (vv. 16-17), but anger from the nations (v. 18). In verse 19, John was blessed to look into the temple wherein he saw the Ark of Covenant. On the earth, however, there were lightning, thunder, and earthquake and a great hailstorm.

diagnosed with hypoplastic left heart syndrome, a life-threatening condition where the left side of the heart is severely underdeveloped and that requires several surgeries. Upon receiving the diagnosis, the couple asked West to terminate the pregnancy. West refused and instead moved to Texas, where abortion is banned, and requested a state district judge to grant her custody, saying she couldn’t trust the parents to provide medical care for the child she named Gabriel.

She gave birth to a boy whom the couple named Rumi on Aug. 12 in Dallas. In subsequent court hearings in Dallas, Gilkar and Ahmed confirmed they had considered abortion and said the dispute took a dramatic turn after West refused to come to California to meet with medical teams to discuss the child’s future care. Matching court decisions in California, Texas courts also ruled against West’s request to obtain custody over the child. "We are truly grateful that Rumi can continue receiving the treatment he needs to survive, and that he will not be stripped

away from what has been described by doctors as the excellent care of his parents,” said Adam Wolf, an attorney for Gilkar and Ahmed, in a statement Tuesday. “Ms. West’s legal filings across three jurisdictions, state courts of appeals, and now the U.S. Supreme Court have sought to undermine Rumi’s parents’ right to provide him with the care he needs. Those efforts have been rejected by every single court." According to a brief filed by Rumi’s court-appointed attorney, the baby’s doctor at Children’s Hospital in Dallas testified that

Gilkar and Ahmed have agreed to recommended treatment for their child. The doctor recommended that Texas courts allow Gilkar and Ahmed to bring Rumi back to Los Angeles, where they live, for care, according to court filings. The Texas Supreme Court has also declined to bar the biological parents from taking Rumi back to California. While West is disappointed with Kagan’s decision not to intervene, she’s pleased that her legal fight has resulted in the biological parents acknowledging publicly their intentions to commit to lifesaving care, West’s at-

torney Lincoln Davis Wilson said “That’s what McKenna has been fighting for from day One,” Wilson said. But Wilson took issue with the parents claiming they are the only ones working to keep Rumi alive and healthy. “Nothing could be further from the truth,” Wilson said. “After his birth, they remain under a court order to continue providing that care. Every life-saving decision has been made for them, not by them.” This article first appeared on The Texas Tribune.

positive, hopeful reflections of what one has endured and overcome, while other stories are of unresolved trauma and internal, moral conflict. For Jones, his scars told him the latter, and his pain manifested in ways that had him ready to give up.

“Death is easy. I wasn’t afraid of death. I was afraid of living,” he said while reflecting on his previous outlook on life.

A cloud seemed to follow Jones as he battled health issues, lost loved ones, and fought drug addiction and loneliness.

“Parkland has saved me many times,” Jones declares, referring to the many instances of inpatient care and medical treatment he received in the hospital.

However, it was his willingness to be saved in the first place that allowed Parkland to help.

But letting go of the wheel and trusting someone else to drive was unlike Jones’ nature, especially considering his distrust of people began as a child.

Act 1: Drifting

“You’re either drifting, driving or being led,” Jones said as he described what he believes are the three stages of life. “And for the majority of my life, from 10 years old to 25 years old, I drifted.”

His childhood got off to such a rocky start that every lesson learned—good, bad or indifferent—was learned the hard way.

Suicidal. Abused. Frustrated. Disappointed. Lost.

“That’s how I grew up,” Jones said.

Abandoned as a child, the now 54-year-old grew up in the foster care system where he was abused by the very people entrusted with his care.

“I was really frustrated at religion because the Christians that raised me were the ones who abused me,” Jones revealed.

Home, a place of refuge, turned out to be unsafe, while a religious affiliation meant to give direction and purpose was no longer trustworthy. This was Jones’ perspective. As a result, he ran away and relied heavily on drugs to suppress his pain.

To feel was to hurt and in Jones’ own words: “I didn’t want to feel.”

After some time, he arrived at the steps of who he calls, “Grandma Edith Lewis,” who ran a shelter for troubled children in Garland. Under her care, he learned how to read and write and earned his high school diploma. She also introduced him to boxing, which led to Regional Golden Gloves championships and great success.

He went on to Peru State College in Nebraska, and then to the Dallas College Richland Campus where he was a top athlete and even trained others.

“I was a superhero,” Jones said.

But even superheroes have weaknesses, and despite feeling better than ever, his kryptonite came in the form of cardiovascular issues.

Act 2: Driving

“From 25 to 40 years old, I was driving myself.”

And under his own navigation, there was promise and direction. He secured a job at the post office while

Beyond the game and halftime show, State Fair Classic tickets provide access to the State Fair of Texas and the Midway, as well as pre-and post-game entertainment

on the Chevy Main Stage, including Pykn Beard, Steve Ray Ladson, The Boykinz Sisters, and JAYDON.

Election Day is almost here, and it is a good time to make sure all eligible voters are prepared to make their mark. The deadline to register to vote is Monday, Oct. 5. Early voting will run from Monday, Oct. 19 to Friday, Oct. 30. Registered voters can cast their ballot at any early voting location in their county of registration. To find a polling location, use the My Voter Portal, which will show locations two days prior to the first day of early voting. On Election Day, Nov. 3, all Dallas ISD schools will

be closed and voters can go to any location in their county of registration. Polls are open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at all polling locations. For questions, consult the County Elections Office. Under Texas law, voters must present one of the following seven acceptable forms of identification at the polls when voting in person:

- Texas driver's license issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety
- Texas Election Identification Certificate

issued by DPS

- Texas personal identification card issued by DPS
- Texas handgun license issued by DPS
- United States military identification card containing the person's photograph
- United States citizenship certificate containing the person's photograph or
- Passport

continuing to work out and train, but most importantly, he reconnected with his biological mother.

“This helped to heal my heart,” Jones said about the long-awaited reunion. “I had so much anger and resented women because my mother left when I was a child, then I was abused in the foster home.”

He had weathered pothole after pothole, but in April 2012, his road presented a sinkhole he couldn't simply drive around.

He had a stroke. Six months later, he lost his job.

With no employment and no ability to train at the gym as he had his entire adult life, Jones spiraled into depression.

Many difficult years followed. In 2019, congestive heart failure brought him to Parkland, for the first of three heart surgeries. Two more procedures followed in 2022 and 2024.

But it was in the aftermath of his first operation that his biological mother—whom he had grown especially close to—passed away and his depression worsened.

“I tried to overdose. I tried to kill myself. I was justifying suicide,” Jones

recalled.

He survived being shot twice, being drugged and left for dead, while also enduring the deaths of his biological mother and, later, his foster mother.

Jones credits Parkland with helping him survive repeated medical crises. But looking back, he also believes his faith gave him a reason to keep going, despite the complicated relationship with Christianity that began during his childhood.

“I didn’t want to miss God by killing myself. There was a feeling inside of me that knew something [God] existed, I just couldn’t put my finger on it,” Jones said.

Act 3: Being Led

Turning his life around was anything but easy. His hardest lesson, however, was learning that he had to relinquish control, stop driving and allow God to take the wheel.

“I’m being led by God while I’m riding in the back of the truck.”

In addition to the heart surgeries he underwent at Parkland, Jones also entered therapy and credits Mental Health Counselor Carlos Ramon for helping rehabilitate his mind.

“Parkland saved my life,” he said. “From the surgeries to the counseling, down to the medicine they’ve given me.”

Now Jones is using the rest of his nine lives to encourage others by sharing not only his story, but also the faith that has guided his recovery. He has published two books and is working on two more, all centered on his Christian faith and his commitment to serving others.

“The last seven years have been the most triumphant time in my life because I’ve grown mentally and spiritually,” Jones proudly proclaimed. “Everyone I ever loved is gone, but I still have ministry and mentorship.”

Some scars, like the emotional wound left by his mother’s death, remain unhealed, but the memories from his darkest times serve a new purpose. They no longer haunt or represent unresolved trauma, instead, reminding Jones what he’s overcome and has been delivered from.

He may not be driving himself anymore, but even from the back of the truck, the journey and destination have never been clearer.

Prevent Falls. Protect Your Independence

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) says more than 14 million adults age 65 and older report falling each year. That's about 1 in 4 older adults. About 37% of those falls cause injury, resulting in an estimated 9 million injuries every year. Falls remain the leading cause of injury among older adults, but many can be prevented with simple changes.

LaTrica Rhynes-Hicks, PhD, Clinic Educator in Parkland Health's Center for Geriatric Care and Healthy Aging, says the growing number of older adults makes fall prevention more important than ever.

“More than 10,000 U.S. baby boomers turn 65 each day, meaning nearly seven people reach that milestone every minute,” she explains. “This increases the likelihood that fall-related injuries and deaths will leap in the coming years. That’s why preventing falls is a top priority for older adults, their families and caregivers.”

Dr. Rhynes-Hicks recommends these simple steps to lower your risk of falling:

- Stay active with balance and strength exercises.
- Ask your healthcare provider about your fall risk.
- Review your medicines with your doctor or pharmacist.
- Get your eyes and hearing checked every year.
- Remove clutter, improve lighting and install grab bars at home.
- Stay connected with family and friends who can help if needed.
